
A holiday light trail, firepits, an Enchanted Forest, Vendor Village, a beer garden, Santa's Workshop. You could be forgiven for thinking this might be about Busch Gardens or Kings Dominion. This is about the Reston Association's very first Winterfest held at Brown's Chapel recreation area by Lake Newport last weekend

Co-sponsored by Reston Community Center and FGMArchitects, Winterfest is an event designed to bring the community together. Visitors enjoyed a 0.41-mile lighted trail walk that included flowers, snowflakes, playful animals, a picture frame and more. Attendees meandered through the Enchanted Forest and visited the Vendor Village that was festively decorated with luminaries, fire pits, musical performances. 

Fitness and Belonging: A Winning Combination at New Trail Cycling & Strength

With the global pandemic coming just 18 months after New Trail Cycling & Strength opened in November 2018, the studio's survival was an uphill ride. "Community was the only thing that kept my business going," said owner Liz Kamp. "It was easy for people to turn to the free options from the big companies like Peloton[®], but people stuck with us because it was important to them that we opened up again. I leaned on them, and they leaned on me."

Kamp's original mission was to create an inclusive atmosphere where people of all fitness levels would feel comfortable and get an invigorating, intense, and fun workout. Clients know the unofficial motto is "come as you are." That means, regardless of your muscle mass, BMI, off-brand workout wear, and any questions or insecurities, there will be a coach, staff, and community ready to welcome you and help you meet your

goals. Benefits include the comfort of community, the importance of strong muscles, and the safety of working with experienced coaches.

In childhood, most people learn to exercise by playing an organized sport. As we age, it can be harder to maintain musculoskeletal health because we may not have a good blueprint for safe and effective strength training or cardio machine workouts. For example, I played soccer until age 18, ran with friends in my 20s and by the time I had kids, I had no idea what to do to feel fit.

New Trail's early morning 50-minute cycling class quickly became my sanctuary. I enjoyed cycling with others - without a leaderboard or someone shouting at me. Instructors coach throughout the ride, cheering you on as you pedal uphill or sprint on a flat stretch. The music is the perfect counterpart. Sure, I might have used my own competitive spirit to pedal faster than the person beside me, but I never wondered where I

stood in the class. I simply felt stronger and happier as part of a small group of people sweating it out.

Kamp celebrates everyone who shows up and keeps track of cycling, yoga, strength, and personal training classes attended. Five-year New Trail veteran Melanie Miller-Cvilikas has attended more than 1,000 classes. "Ir is clear to me that the mission to be an inclusive community for exercise has expanded into a community where members support each other," she said. "Friends have turned into a family where we show up for the sad times and the celebrations. This invitation is always extended to everyone. The tagline on the wall, "I CAN.I WILL." has become "WE CAN. WE WILL."

Longtime member Jerri Lynn Wilson agreed. "New Trail is truly a supportive community. Showing up to exercise is like returning to a familiar place where people know your name and care how you are doing."

opportunity to visit with Santa at the Lake House (a separate ticket was required).

Tickets for Reston Association members were free, and other community members paid \$18. Online tickets were timed-entry tickets meant for crowd control, and the slots filled up quickly, but whenever possible, RA worked to open up slots so that more people in the community could attend.

How did an event like this come about? Cara O'Donnell, Director of Communications and Community Engagement for Reston Association, said that the team at Reston Association had been talking for several years about creating a "signature" event for the community, something that could be held annually. Once they decided to move forward with Winterfest, they signed sponsors through individual outreach.

"Winterfest has been a truly collaborative process for the entire RA community," said O'Donnell. "The generosity of our sponsors, the support from our community, and the enthusiasm from our team have all come together to create this wonderful event for Reston, and we look forward to Winterfest becoming a part of Reston's holiday traditions."

It has been an all-hands-on-deck event for the Reston Association staff. Wednesday afternoon found the Executive Team, the Parks and Recreation team and the Central Services Team all on hand to create a magical environment. While it has been an intense effort, most aspects of setting up Winterfest went smoothly. The event, from Thursday, Nov. 30 to Saturday, Dec. 2, ran each evening from 5 to 9 p.m. Friday rain cut down on crowds, but most of the evening ended up being pleasant anyway. During the three days, over 3,000 people had a chance to enjoy this magical adventure. Reserve a spot early next year to ensure a festive night out. Since there was quite a bit of buzz in the community, this event is likely to be even more popular in 2024.

Many are esteemed alumni of South Lakes High School, and all have achieved noteworthy accomplishments.

The exhibit highlights the remarkable career of Grant Hill, an internationally known NBA Hall of Fame basketball player, and other high achievers including Mikie Sherrill, second-term Congresswoman from New Jersey; Kim Crabbe, the first African American to play on the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team; Nate Mook, former CEO of World Central Kitchen; Benny Blanco, award-winning record producer; and Eddie Timanus, fivetime "Jeopardy!" champion.

Mon Ami Gabi Will Shut Its Doors Dec. 31



Many in Reston recognize the name Mon Ami Gabi. Located in Reston Town Center, the classic French bistro has been a staple for 15 years. So, it came as a bit of a shock to many when Mon Ami Gabi announced in November that it would be closing on the last day of the year.

The restaurant was beloved by patrons for its ambiance and authentic French cuisine, including chocolate mousse, beef bourguignon, many steak options, and escargot. The restaurant, owned by the company Lettuce Entertain You, is one of only four locations, the others located in Bethesda, New York City, and Las Vegas. Mon Ami Gabi has occupied a large space at Reston Town Center since it opened in 2008. In addition to its regular lunch and dinner menu, the restaurant was also a popular brunch option for holidays like Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Easter.

Mon Ami Gabi had been accepting reservations for its popular pajama brunch, a New Year's Day tradition at the restaurant, but notified those who had been planning to celebrate the first day of 2024 there that its last day of regular service would be Dec. 31. The restaurant will operate its regular hours and carry out until then.

Let Your Light Shine, Lake Thoreau!

Lake Thoreau shines brighter this time of year, and those twinkling bulbs reflecting on the lake represent thousands of dollars of donations to local nonprofits. The 11th Annual Festival of Winter Lights Lights, organized by the Lakek Thoreau Entertainment Association, is taking place this month.

The concept is simple: residents on Lake Thoreau decorate their lake-facing homes and boats with lights, and generous Restonians pledge to make donations to local nonprofits. The pledges can either be per home/boat donations (for example, \$1 per lit home/boat) or a flat donation. The goal of Lake Thoreau's Festival of Winter Lights is to "make it a community-wide thing where everybody can feel like they're contributing toward a common goal [supporting] local charities," said Dave Prochnow, organizer with the Lake Thoreau Entertainment Association. The 2022 event was successful with "196 homes and boats lit up last year, with the total collection just slightly over \$10,000," says Prochnow. Those donations went to Cornerstones, Public Art Reston, Friends of Reston, South Lakes Food Pantry, Reston Scholarship Fund, and Blue Ridge Wildlife Center. All Restonians can enjoy the twinkling lights by taking a stroll around Lake Thoreau in the evening in December. The view is especially beautiful when timed with the sunset, which you can enjoy from the benches along the path parallel to South Lakes Drive.

MAKING AN IMPACT: How Kurt Rose Gives Back

Growing up in Reston, Kurt Rose made a decision based on his positive life experiences. "I said if I ever have kids, I want them to grow up in Reston," he recalled. Years later, that is exactly what he and his wife Dianne provided for their son and daughter. "We bought a home on Salt Kettle Way in 1999, around the corner from the three schools that I went to -South Lakes High School (class of '85), Langston Hughes Middle, and Terraset Elementary."

Growing up in Newbridge and Greenskeeper Court, Kurt played on the nearby tennis and basketball courts and explored the bike paths regularly. At age 16, he took a part-time job at Reston International Jewelers, an opportunity that provided a direction for his life. "The business soon grew on me, and I knew it was the business I wanted to be in," he said.

Then in 1993, Rick Little, the man Kurt worked with at Reston International Jewelers, told Kurt he was opening his own jewelry store. "Rick wanted me to come along with him, which I did," Kurt said. "Best decision I ever made."

That decision resulted in establishing Aspen Jewelry Designs, located at the

Clocktower Center in Herndon where Kurt said, "I support the community I love with the work that I love." He began providing that support in 2005 through the Rotary Club of Herndon-Reston, when "fellow Rotarian Richard Downer and I introduced Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to the children of Herndon. We were the first in Virginia to establish the project, which delivers a free book every month to children, ages 0 through 5 years. There are currently 1,500 children in Herndon receiving free books monthly."

Kurt expanded that initiative by helping form the RoSigle Community Giving Foundation along with Dianne, who is a preschool teacher, and community volunteer Andy Sigle and his wife, librarian Kim Sigle. "Our first goal at RoSigle was to bring Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to Reston, which we did in October of 2022," Kurt said. "Currently, 600 Reston children under age 5 receive a free book every month."

Kurt proudly cited other accomplishments of the RoSigle Foundation, including "the Reading With Roz program, which provides free books at the South Lakes High School PTSA Food Pantry.

Through the 'Kids R First' charity, we provide funds for children who are at or below poverty level at Dogwood Elementary School, so they can receive proper school supplies."

RoSigle is also the school sponsor at the Reston Museum's annual Lake Anne Cardboard Boat Regatta, which Kurt called "an excellent team-building exercise for young minds, and we are working with the Reston Community Center to create a bookmobile so we can get free books to the elementary and middle school ages."

Kurt is firmly committed to making an impact. "It has been a wonderful ride at both Aspen and RoSigle, and my biggest goal is to keep the rides going and to get more books into the hands of more children and help as many young minds as possible."





South Lakes High School football team puts together an undefeated season for the first time in team history

Commanders Legends Eddie Mason, Josh Wilson, Ricky Ervins, and Josh Morgan were on hand, and presented \$1000 to each football program on behalf of the Washington Commanders charitable foundation and Northwest Federal Credit Union.

In his fifth season with the team, Coach Jason Hescock led his squad with unwavering determination, citing a powerful mantra: "Find a way to win." Hescock's approach emphasized embracing challenges and adversity with a resolute spirit. It was applied well in the thrilling and closely contested Bulldog battle on Nov. 3. The Seahawks emerged victorious, securing their place in the school's history books and completing a season filled with hardfought battles, including a significant upset over Madison.

Senior running back Isaac Copeland, overcoming injuries in his high school career, had a breakout season, becoming an instrumental part of the team's success. Senior captain and quarterback Nick Harris led the Concorde District in passing yards and passing touchdowns, orchestrated an explosive offensive attack with senior receivers James Zschunke (captain) and Brian Kennedy contributing to the touchdown tally. Showcasing the team's offensive prowess also included junior Xvavier Swain, who anchored the offensive line, providing essential protection for Harris and opportunities for Copeland to shine.

The heart and soul of the Seahawks' success originated from the senior-heavy defense, led by captain safety Jack Schnabel and linebackers Jacob Kyger and Cameron Theis. Senior cornerback Misha Zarechnak made his presence felt by leading the district with interceptions. Defensive end Savion Grante contributed many game-changing sacks and crucial tackles which proved pivotal to the team's victories.



James Clear, the author of "Atomic Habits" notes that the systems we have in place, or the small, consistent steps we take daily (and not the actual goals), play the most important role in creating change. Restaurant Review Bombay Velvet at RTC West

Dark, moody, and delicious are three words that describe Bombay Velvet, Reston's go-to restaurant for progressive Indian cuisine. When my husband and I walked into the restaurant at 7 on a Friday evening, we were surprised to see that it wasn't overly crowded. It seems that Bombay Velvet comes alive around 8 p.m. when the restaurant was bustling with families, friends chatting over a few drinks, and a couple or two sharing a romantic night out.

One of the first things we noticed is that the menu has a lot of choices. They offer popular dishes like Butter Chicken and Tandoori Chicken; traditional and regionally-inspired dishes like Amritsari Macchi, a fried cod dish from the Punjab region, and Biryani. We opted for the Malabar Prawn Curry, a flavorful, creamy shrimp dish, and the Sarso Ka Saag, yummy, simmered mustard leaves best served over a bed of Ghee Rice.

We loved the attention to detail and thoughtfulness clearly put into each dish. This was particularly evident in their Nimish dessert, a cloud-like concoction with a name that means "wealth," because of the time spent preparing it. Bombay Velvet chefs spend hours caramelizing milk and then charging it with nitrogen, resulting in its airy, foam-like consistency.

Although Bombay Velvet has, without a doubt, a delicious selection of both Western-influenced and traditional dishes, their cocktail menu is a stand-out. I would not describe myself as a "cocktail person." Instead, I often opt for a dry wine. However, with ingredients like chili chutney, tamarind, rose, and chai, I had to give their cocktails a try. They did not disappoint. The Lychee and Rose Petal Martini was light, delicate, and velvety. Those looking for something a little spicier should opt for the Mausam, a complex profile of passionfruit, spices, and pepper. For something dangerously delicious, cocktail aficionados should look no further than the Backwaters. Don't be fooled by the overly-decorated glassware; this drink is not kidding around. It is a grown-up version of a Pina Colada – it has a 401K and everything!

After experiencing Bombay Velvet, I was not surprised to hear that they're expanding to a new location in Columbia Heights. General Manager, Satyam Rai, said Reston was chosen for its first location because it is a good community that offered Bombay Velvet the opportunity to get on the map. This reporter couldn't agree more. I am so grateful to have a new close-to-home date night spot.

Carbon Monoxide Home Hazards

The winter home heating season brings risks of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide is an odorless gas that is a result of incomplete combustion. It replaces oxygen in the blood. In high enough doses, it will cause death within minutes.

This is why it is important to have fireplaces and furnaces maintained for efficiency and proper ventilation. Installing a functioning carbon monoxide detector with alarm in appropriate places can alert you to such dangers.

The danger is significant. According to the CDC, more than 400 people die annually in the United States from accidental carbon monoxide poisoning. More than 100,000 people visit the emergency room from accidental poisoning.

The first symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning can include mild headache and breathlessness. People with chronic heart disease, anemia, and respiratory problems can be more susceptible to poisoning. In addition, carbon monoxide exposure and poisoning can be very dangerous for unborn children, increasing the risks of developmental disorders and fetal death.

Carbon monoxide is slightly lighter than air, but not enough to rise to the top of a room. Rather it disperses itself, evenly mixing with the air. This is be-

cause the difference in density between air and carbon monoxide is minimal.

Some people mistakenly think carbon monoxide is heavier than air. However, it is carbon dioxide that is heavier than air. Hence, there is a myth that carbon monoxide alarms should be installed lower on the wall. Instead, take the time to read the detector's instructions for placement as specified in those instructions.

The International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC), the Consumer Product Safety Commission, and most building codes recommend one detector on each floor level and within 10 feet of each bedroom. The IAFC also suggests a detector near or over every attached garage. The EPA recommends that detectors be placed on a wall five feet above the floor or at eye level. It is generally recommended to replace detectors every five to seven years.

Be mindful of other places carbon monoxide can accumulate, such in a closed garage with an automobile engine running. Never run a generator in an enclosed room without proper ventilation. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, call 911.
